The purpose of this study is to examine girls' experiences of oppression, exploring ways that they experience, engage in meaning making, and actively resist sexism. Further, the project examines the ways in which adult educators perceive girls' resistance. This study has a unique opportunity to examine possible changes over time by comparing data collected in this project to an initial 6-year study in the same school system. In particular, this project will seek to explore whether and how girls' resistance has shifted (or not) over time, with particular emphasis placed on exploring the role of social media in girls' resistance.

In Allegheny County, Pennsylvania, Black girls are 11 times more likely than White girls to be referred to the juvenile court, while nationally, Black girls are referred three times as often. The proposed research will evaluate an empowerment-based program for Black girls designed to challenge negative perceptions, prevent violence, and improve their health via advocacy, restorative practices, and participatory research. This research aims to address the following questions via a mixed-methods, longitudinal and participatory approach: 1) Can an empowerment-focused intervention prevent violence and improve Black girls' health?; 2) Can this empowerment-focused intervention shift adults' and girls' narratives about Black girls? There is growing national awareness of the challenges faced by Black girls and now is an opportune time to document and disseminate evidence-based models that address these inequities.

Co-Investigator: Dr. Sean McGreevey, Bellarmine College The purpose of this study is to pilot and assess the use of the Circle of 6 App. This study will gain information about whether/how implementation of the Circle of 6 App is useful for Chatham University students with hopes to better understand students' conversations about getting support from community members. This study will also examine bystanders' awareness about sexual assault and intentions to intervene if needed.

Investigator: Mentoring Models to Empower African American Girls

Chatham University

This project examined the mentoring model used by the organization to build relationships between staff and clients. This project utilizes interviews and is the first phase of a multiple-phase research study.

Investigator: *Pedagogical tools for Teaching Intersectionality Theory* Chatham University

The purpose of this research study is to examine educational procedures used to teach intersectionality theory to master's level psychology students. In addition to reading about intersectionality theory, students focus on an in-depth exploration of one cultural/ethnic group throughout the semester, practicing how to think intersectionally. Examples have included learning about Arab Americans and Muslims, and Native Americans and First Nations peoples. The research has explored how students

conceptualize intersectionality and its utility for counseling as well as changes in the students' attitudes about the specific ethnic/cultural group.

Investigator: Adolescent Girls and Activism

Chatham University

The purpose of this project was to explore adolescent girls' attitudes about social issues and factors which influence their decision to engage (or not) in social action. The study will examine whether girls' attitudes change over the course of a year-long participatory action research project. During the project, students from an all-girls high school will participate in workshops about activism and social issues. The workshops taught the girls about various forms of activism, current and historical activists and teach basic skills to develop an activism proposal plan.

Investigator: *Multicultural Competence, Advocacy and Activism* Chatham University

The purpose of this project was to examine master's level counseling psychology students' development of multicultural competence and commitment to activism and advocacy work. The study examined if and how student's multicultural competence changes over the course of their required Culture and Identity class. The project also explored the impact on students of developing a social change advocacy plan proposal within their course.

Investigator: College Women's Empowerment and Activism

Chatham University

The purpose of the project was to explore college women's definitions of empowerment and activism and to examine how they are influenced by participating in an activism project. The project included quantitative measures of activism and open-ended questions about definitions of empowerment and engagement in activism behaviors.

Co-Investigator: Impact of a Women's College on development and Well-Being Chatham University

The central purpose of the research study was to explore experiences unique to attending a women-only college that significantly impact women's development and well-being.

Investigator: FAIR+ Program: Teaching Children Fairness and Decreasing Bullying Chatham University

The project consisted of implementing the FAIR+ program in schools and summer camp to teach children about equality and decrease instances of gender based bullying. The project included quantitative measures of gender identity, experiences of identity-based bullying, attitudes about gender roles, and attitudes about social class. Students also participated in focus groups where they discussed their experiences of sexism, classism and/or racism, their gender identity development, and perceived barriers to intervening when they witness identity-based bullying.

Co-Investigator: College Students' Responses to Experienced and Witnessed Gender *Prejudice*

In conjunction with Department of Psychology, Colorado State University Co-Investigator: Lee A. Rosén, PhD

This study examined how college men and women respond when they experience gender prejudice as well as when they witness gender prejudice being experienced by their peers. Examined the impact of feminist activism and coping styles on response. Explored the process by which students consider whether or not to respond confrontationally to such events and the factors that influence this decision. Identified potential coping strategies for distress generated when experiencing or witnessing gender prejudice.

Co-Investigator: Young Women's Wellness Research and Intervention Program In affiliation with the University of Utah

Co-Investigator: Kandie Brinkman, PhD and Lisa Diamond, PhD

Six- year longitudinal research project studying adolescent girls' experiences with sexism and resiliency factors. The project was based on a mixed methods approach, incorporating quantitative methods as well as qualitative case study techniques.

Utilized qualitative content analysis to explore distress caused by the events, reactions to the events, and coping mechanisms used to deal with the events. Examined relationships between these factors and feminist activism, attitudes about gender roles, and levels of self-objectification utilizing chi-square analysis and logistical regression analysis.
